The beam is projected through a hole covered with fiber glass in rear of the se-dan, Boyce explained. The radar device has its limitations, Boyce said, since it will not tell which vehicle is exceeding the limit so the operator views the vehicles as they pass through the radar beam, and watches their speed being recorded.
