21454. A green arrow or an official traffic control signal means that vehicular traffic

GREEN ARROW

facing the signal may cautious-ly enter the intersection to make the movement indicated by the green arrow but shall yield the right-of-way to other vehicles and to pedestrians lawfully within the intersection or an adjacent crosswalk at the time such green arrow is exhibited. Vehicular traffic may make a semicircular or U-turn only where such turn is permitted by signs erected at such location. A green ar-row may be displayed alone or with red, yellow or green. It is unlawful to operate a

traffic signal which is equipped with a green light and a red arrow which are shown simultaneously.

WALK, WAIT, OR DON'T WALK 21456. Whenever an official traffic control signal exhibiting the words "walk" or "wait" or "don't walk" are in place, the signals shall indicate as fol-

lows:
(a) Walk. A pedestrian facing the signal may proceed across the roadway in the di-rection of the signal or in a diagonal direction across the roadway within the intersec-tion if so instructed by signs or signals installed at or near the intersection.

(b) Wait or Don't Walk. No pedestrian shall start to cross the roadway in the direction of such signal, but any pedes-trian who has partially com-pleted his crossing on the
