County Health Officer Endemic typhus fever is an acute infectious disease trans-mitted to man by the bites of an infeced rat flea. and sporadic outbreaks are al ways a possibility. THE FORM of the disease that occurs in Los Angeles County is generally mild and is usually rat-borne, although other rodents may also be in-fected. When the fleas are transmitted to household pets, they are usually availed into they are usually carried into the house and become a men-ace to the human inhabitants. Likewise, when infected rats are permitted to infest the premises the danger of human infection is imminent.

Louse-borne or epidemic typhus fever occurs only when sanitation conditions are extremely poor and where over crowding in living quarters is the rule. This epidemic form of the disease is found in many parts of the world including certain areas in Mexico, South certain areas in Mexico, South America, Asia, Africa and Eastern Europe, Travellers are therefore advised to obtain in-oculations against epidemic typhus fever when going to these areas.
