Californians will turn to their Californians will turn to their favorite outdoor living and with this in mind, today's guest selected a "Shish Kebab" to replace the traditional hamburger and steak; an easy-to-fix vegetable and a pilaf that needs only a salad and dessert to supply a full

Shish Kebab

1 leg lamb 3 large onions 2 tbsp. salt (seasoned)

1 cup red wine (table) 1/4 cup vegetable oil salt and pepper

Bone the meat; remove most of the fat and gristle; cut into 11/2 inch squares. Chop onions, add seasonings. Mix all ingredients, marinate overnight. Place on skewers and broil over charcoal fire. Keep turning the skewers until meat is golden brown on all sides. Serves 6. Serve with broiled tomatoes, green pepper and egg plant chunks. Brush vegetables with oil before broiling. It is best not to put vegetables with meat on same skewer since cooking time varies. Cook vegetables first.

Zucchini Sauash

(beaten)

6 to 8 Zucchini squash (medium size)

2 cans tomato sauce 1 lb. Jack cheese (Monterey)

Par-boil squash in boiling water 8 to 10 minutes or until tender. Remove from water, cool. Slice squash lengthwise and place in glass pyrex dish 10 x 12 with cut side up. Place a slice of cheese over each slice of squash. Beat eggs with beater, add tomato sauce, salt and pepper to taste. Pour mixture over squash. Bake at 350 for 1 hour or until golden brown.

Rice Pilaf

1 cup rice (long grain) 1/2 vermicelli 1/s lb. butter

2 cup broth (chicken or meat) salt to taste

Melt butter in a shallow pan. Break up vermicelli into pieces and fry in the butter until slightly browned, stirring constantly. Add rice, broth and salt. Bring to a rolling boil. Stir, cover and cook on low fire for 25 minutes. Stir before serving.
