City Share Of License Fees Paid

This city's share of the state vehicle license fees totaled \$2526,501, according to figures released by the State Comp-troller's Office this week. A June payment of nearly \$127,-000 was made. The money, alloted on a population basis to cities and counties, is returned to the cities in lieu of a property tax on motor vehicles. Torrance received a \$399,000

on motor vehicles. Torrance received a \$399,000 advance on the June appor-tionment in April. A total of \$123 million was apportioned during the year, according to the fiscal year re-port. Los Angeles county re-ceived an apportionment of more than \$25 million. The lion's share went to the county's five largest cities.
