Cost of the storm drain is expected to be about \$920,000. A retention basin and pump station are to be built northwest of 236th Street and Hawthorne Boulevard. The main line will run from the pump station west in 236th Street to an existing drain at Madison

The project is to be financed as part of a \$225 million drain bond issue approved in 1958. Construction is expected to take about a year after work

Work on te project is sceduled to begin at once.



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
