Exchange Students Belgium, Italy Send Pupils to Torrance

President Eisenhower's
People-to-People program
was inaugurated a few years
back with tremendous success, and President Kennedy's
Peace Corps has been enthus. Peace Corps has been enthus-iastically received both here and abroad. Yet, one of the

oldest such programs re-ceives little mention. The American Field Service annually brings more than 800 foreign students to the United States for a year of study in American schools.

Torrance is one of the many cities that plays host to these junior ambassadors from abroad, and this year, as in years past, three stuas in years past, three stu-dents will attend our local

high schools.
Two of the students, Vin-Clesse and Andrea ciane Honarati, arrived here last week. A third, Araceli Blan-co, is scheduled to arrive very shortly.

Meeting the two students at the airport were their foster parents for the next year. Vinciane will live with foster parents for the next year. Vinciane will live with Mr. and Mrs. Don Hyde and their daughter, Gail, at 1537 El Prado. She will attend Torrance High. Andrea was met by Mr. and Mrs. Fred Schweigert and their chil-dren, Byron and Carmen, of 631 Camino de Encanto. He will attend South High School.

Vinciane is a pretty, 18year-old Belgium girl, and came from the capital city of Brussels. She has two broth-

ers, and her father is a manager at a match company in Brussels.

Andrea, who comes from Ancona, Italy, has a brother and sister. He is a tall, dark-haired, handsome young man and will celebrate his seventeenth birthday in this coun-

Both of the students are planning to attend a univer-sity after they complete their high school education. Vin-ciane, who speaks French, Flemish, and English, also studies Greek and Latin and hopes to be an interpreter. Andrea wants to study mathematics and physics.

Vinciane and Andrea trav-eled across the Atlantic with other AFS students on the ship "The Seven Seas." They arrived in Los Angeles on a charter flight.

During the next school year, they will live and study with their "brothers and sis-ters." They will be available for speaking engagements after the first of the year.

After graduating with their classes at Torrance and South High School next June, the two will leave Los Angeles for a three-week tour of the nation, climaxed by a visit to the White House. Shortly, after their visit to Shortly after their visit to Washington, D. C., they will return to their own countries.
