After I got a walking cast I was able to manage fairly well and agreed to take care of two small children for the woman next door. Her housekeeper left and she needed someone to care for her youngsters from 8:30 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. The following week another neighbor asked if I would take her two children with the same financial arrangement.

I love children and am having a marvelous time. Two more women have asked me to take their three-year-olds in the Fall. All this has started me thinking about opening a nursery school. My father says he thinks this may be against the law because I've had only one year of college and am not a qualified teacher. I say I don't need to be a qualified teacher because the children are under five years of age. Am I right? I'd love to start a nursery school but I don't want to get into trouble. — MARGE

Dear Marge: In some states you need more than love to start a nursery school. Check with your local superintendent of public schools and find out what the law says.

If you do not qualify I urge you to return to college and earn the proper credentials. It will be well worth it.
