

Sabin Vaccine Project Plans Near Completion

Six hundred clinics, each equipped to immunize 10,000 persons painlessly, will be set up in Los Angeles County Oct. 21 and 28 in the Project SOS campaign to stamp out polio in Southern California.

Project SOS stands for "Sabin on Sundays," sponsored by the Los Angeles Medical Assn. and five adjacent county medical associations, which utilizes the near-miraculous Sabin oral vaccine.

Sabin vaccine is taken by mouth, two drops on a cube of sugar or 2 c.c.s. of fluid.

THE COUNTY medical associations aim to immunize nine million residents of Southern California in successive two-day Sunday clinics on Oct. 21 and 28, Dec. 2 and 9, and Jan. 20 and 27.

There are three types of polio virus. A separate vaccine is required to immunize for each one.

The six-county SOS cam-

aign is the largest public health program ever attempted in the United States. Clinic hours will be from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. in Los Angeles, Ventura, Orange, Riverside, San Diego and Imperial counties.

RESIDENTS of one county visiting in other counties are urged to receive Sabin inoculations there.

Each of the 400 clinics in Los Angeles County will be

staffed by at least two volunteer physicians, with 15 to 20 nurses and aides assisting.

Clinics will be situated in schools and other public buildings, usually within walking distance. Location of each neighborhood clinic will be announced later, when all arrangements are complete. A donation of 25 cents will be asked for each Sabin dose, but no one will be refused because of inability to pay.

10 Per Cent Boys Continue to Get Under State Skin

Town Hall, a non-partisan men's civic organization devoted to the study and discussion of problems of public importance, sponsored a conference on crime prevention in California in cooperation with the California State Department of Justice, March 24, 1962, and published a detailed report. Their report covers a wide range of crime problems but on page 26 there is a paragraph on loan sharks which is especially interesting because the activities of the loan sharks, who are politely termed "Ten Per Cent Trust Deed Companies," caused me to introduce my Assembly Bill No. 3192, which was enacted into law and became part of the Business and Professions Code in 1955. This was the first "loan shark law" ever enacted in California.

THE LOAN sharks found ways to get around my first law, hence in 1957, I introduced my Assembly Bill No. 1084. It was enacted into law and became part of the Civil Code in 1957. The loan sharks found ways to sneak around this law, too, hence the Legislature has passed several more laws on the same subject, all of which I actively supported.

The pertinent paragraph on page 26 of the 1962 Town Hall report on crime prevention in California reads as follows:

"THE TEN Per Cent Trust Deed Companies

"In his Report to the State Legislature, the Attorney General recommended a comprehensive statute which would deal with the practices of the so-called 10 per cent trust deed companies. The operation of these companies caused a loss of many millions of dollars to the California investing public. The Legislature enacted a statute which, in our opinion, effectively deals with the evils involved in the operation of the 10 percenters.

"Teams of attorneys, auditors, and investigators under the direction of the Attorney General, and with personnel supplied from the various State Departments, through the Board of Investment, have investigated each of the large 10 per cent companies. Some of the malefactors are being tried today, others are under indictment, and investigations are continuing with respect to the principals involved in the other companies."

THE ABOVE statement is essentially correct. I am pleased that Town Hall and the Attorney General are continuing their interest in the anti-loan

shark crusade I started in 1955. However, the above paragraph from the Town Hall report refers to the "loss of millions of dollars to the California investing public." It does not refer to the loss of thousands of homes and millions of dollars by those who borrowed money from the loan sharks. In other words, there is a double loss in dealing with loan sharks. Those who invest money in the "Ten Per Cent Trust Deed Companies" often lose their investment, and those who borrow from these human vultures lose both their homes and their money.

If you want more detailed information than that contained in the Town Hall report, write to California Real Estate Assn., 117 W. 9th St., Los Angeles 15, for their Real Estate Finance Division Bulletin, Vol. 1, No. 8, August 1962. This publication contains valuable information for anyone interested in second mortgages and trust deeds, either as an investor or as a borrower.

IF YOU are not yet in serious trouble and want to obtain valuable information about clever swindlers, write to the Better Business Bureau of Los Angeles, 307 W. 8th St., Los Angeles, or telephone them at MADison 7-6305, before you sign a contract for dancing lessons, accordion lessons, home improvements, swimming pools, fall-out shelters, or stock in uranium mines. However, if you are already in trouble, you can still get helpful advice from the Better Business Bureau, but probably they will tell you to report your problem in writing to the District Attorney of Los Angeles County.

Most rackets (swindles) are not advertised in newspapers but are accomplished by direct-mail solicitation, door-to-door salesmen, and radio and television advertising. Sometimes newspapers innocently carry advertisements for racketeers but as soon as they realize what is going on, they stop running the advertisements. A good example is the sale of real estate in Hawaii, Arizona, Alaska, Florida, and other states. Some of the mountain and desert real estate promotions in California are pure swindles.
