**School District Saves  
 \$340,000 In Past Year**

Through the combined efforts of the Torrance Board of Education and its administrative staff, some \$340,000 less than the amount budgeted last year was spent to operate the schools. After cutting the 1961 tentative budget considerably, the Board reluctantly settled on a figure of \$12,140,000, believed necessary to educate the district's 28,000 pupils this year.

"The administration staff," declared Board President Albert Charles, "did the job for \$11,800,000." Appreciation for cooperation of the entire school staff in effecting these savings was recently expressed by the Board of Education through Charles.

"Since actual income for last year amounted to \$13,148,000 and the amount spent was \$11,800,000," he stated, "it means that approximately \$1,300,000 may now be added to the \$900,000 reserve fund planned and provided for by previous boards of education. This will tide us over in the lean years ahead," he added.

S. E. WALDRIP, assistant superintendent, business, contends that the reserve fund is necessary for several reasons. "We should always have several hundred thousand dollars set aside to meet possible emergencies caused by major catastrophe," he stated, "and each year money must be drawn from the fund to meet the almost million dollar monthly payrolls for October, November and December as tax monies are not received until January. Also we don't expect the assessed valuation

of property to raise appreciably during the next few years which will mean receiving the same amount of income at a time when pupil enrollments are destined to increase by at least 6,000. This," he added, "will necessitate hiring several hundred new teachers, spending thousands of dollars for new textbooks and instructional supplies in 1964 and 1965."

Supt. J. H. Hull summarized the situation by stating that the district will be spending more in 1964 and 1965 than it will probably receive, therefore, the reserve fund must be built now so that it will not have to go into deficit spending later on.

There is enough money authorized by the 1958 bond election to provide classrooms for about half of the increase in school population; however, without an additional \$8,000,000 the building program will come to a stop in 1963, and shortly thereafter several thousand children will be without classrooms.

"WE DON'T WANT to see

this happen," remarked Board member Bert Lynn, "because this would throw us back to where we were three years ago with double sessions and possible curtailments in the curriculum and services."

The Torrance schools have been able to remain off of double session for the past two years only because the Torrance taxpayers voted the \$16,000,000 bond authorization in 1958 thus allowing the district to keep the pace of building in line with population increases.

A somewhat bright side of the picture discloses that authorization of new building bonds will not raise taxes. The schools in borrowing money through the sale of bonds is allowed by law to do so each year only in the amount of 10 per cent of assessed valuation.

Since the district is already bonded to this 10 per cent capacity, present tax rates will not be affected. The voters will be asked to allow the district to continue to sell bonds after the 1958 bond money is used up. This will be sometime early next year.
