play in a well-equipped, fenced playground, arts, crafts, creative play and other education activities in a modern nursery school building located at 4558 W. 182nd St., Torrance.

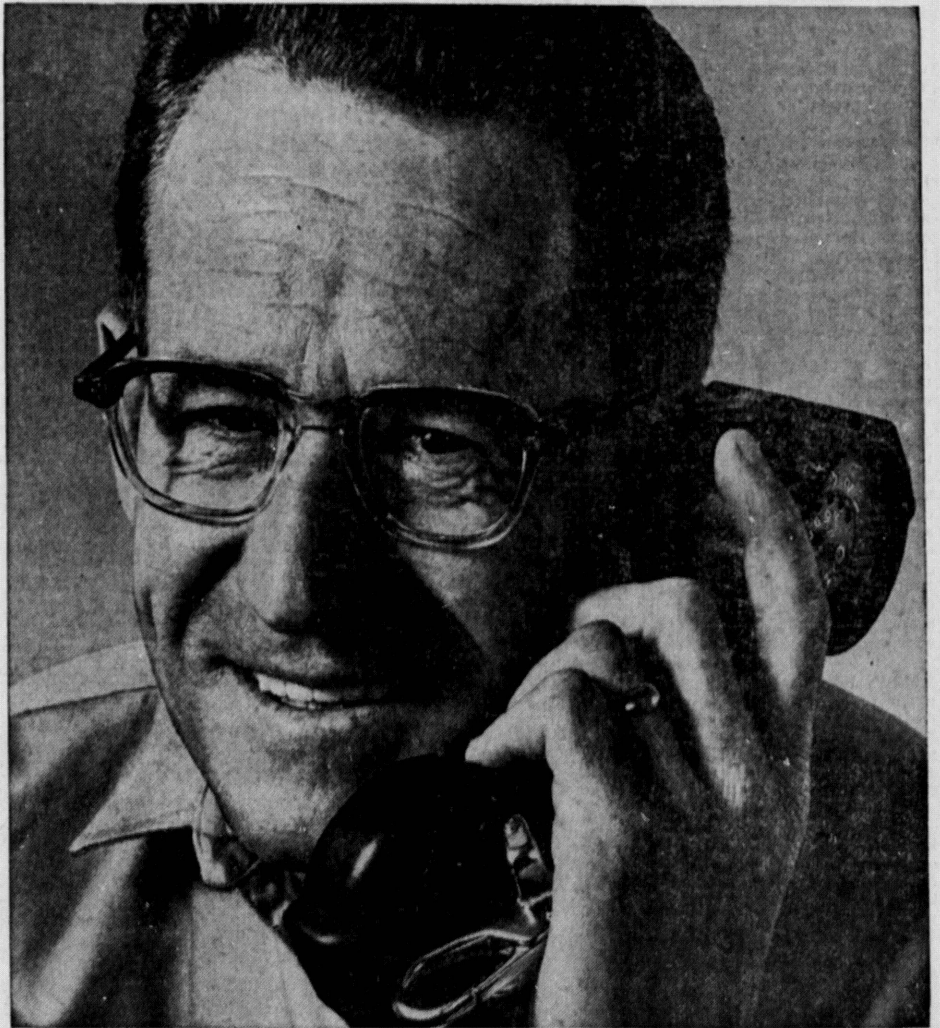
Retired Teachers Picnic on Aug. 28
