Authorized Subjects Listed by City Board

The City Board of Education has adopted the 1962-1963 Catalog of Authorized Subjects for junior and senior high schools in the Los Angeles City School System.

Highlighting the revised catalog are new courses in science and American government and major revisions of five other courses, according to Superintendent of Schools Jack P. Crowther.

Another addition to the catalog, which greatly reflects new graduation requirements approved by the Board in 1961, is a required 10-week course in guidance which will provide educational and vocational information for students.

The two new courses are a general science class now required of all B-8 students and a 12th grade class titled "Contemporary American Problems and Government."

ADDITION OF THE B-8 science course together with a science course offered in A-8 and another offered in either the B-9 or A-9 semester has created an entire new science sequence for junior high school students.

In the A-8 semester emphasis is on methods of scientists, measurement techniques, uses of equipment, properties and studies of matter, and physical and chemical changes. The course meets state requirements for education concerning harmful effects of alcohol and narcotics.

Instruction in the A-8 semester covers the nature of the universe, the solar system, space travel, geologic history of the earth, environment, and variety of structure and function of living things.

NINTH GRADE science will now cover energy and its applications, weather and weather forecasting, and a sequence called "frontiers of science," which will review new developments in oceanography, space, and chemistry of life.

The new course of "Contemporary Problems in American Government" provides study of psychology, economics and sociology, current problems of behavior, learning, free enterprise system, education, vocations, the family and urbanization. It will also examine the

Salk Polio Clinics to Stay Open

School-age youngsters who must complete polio immunization programs in order to meet the new state requirements for entering school may continue receiving Salk vaccine at March of Dimes clinics.

The March of Dimes will continue to operate the Salk clinics through the summer and winter months. Salk vaccine is administered at the clinics for a charge of \$1 for each inoculation.

Many of the clinics operated in the area are discontinuing the Salk vaccine immunization to be ready to administer the Sabin Oral vaccine during the winter months.

Proof of immunization is required by law for all youngsters enrolled in public schools in the state.

AMONG CLASSES which have undergone major realignment of subject matter are B-7 geography, and A-7 history and geography, homemaking I and II which are offered in B-7 and A-7 semester, and "World History and Geography I," which is split over the ninth and tenth grades.

Subject matter in all these courses has been considerably upgraded with the addition of new material on current world events.

Superintendent Crowther said the guidance course is designed to prepare students to make the most of educational opportunities in high school and to provide a study of occupational trends. It also will help pupils plan a program of personal improvement which may lead to educational or vocational betterment.

Also under study by the Board of Education and due for adoption is a course outline for Spanish I through VIII, which are offered in junior and senior high school.

Courses Postponed By School

The Los Angeles City School System will have to postpone \$516,462 in science, mathematics, and foreign language projects because of the district's scarcity of funds, according to Superintendent of Schools Jack P. Crowther.

These projects were scheduled to be financed under the National Defense Education Act and would have been partially paid by the federal government in cooperation with the State Department of Education.

Superintendent Crowther emphasized that although the projects are being postponed they will not be abandoned and probably will be financed by the district over the next three or four years rather than at the present time.

"WE CONSIDER all of these projects important to our curriculum program. However, under the NEA the district would be required to pay the full amount in advance and would not receive reimbursement until a later date, and at the present time we do not have the funds available for such an expenditure," the superintendent said.

The National Defense Education Act provides funds on a matching basis to local school districts for curriculum materials used for science, mathematics, and foreign language courses.

All of these projects being postponed are in elementary and secondary schools. Some \$114,680 budgeted for junior college projects will not be affected, the superintendent said.
