Levy New Grid Coach For North

Every year, the same problems occur on North High football teams — lack of experience and weight. Under new head coach Ed Levy, who is replacing Bob Shoup, the Saxons will once again be small, but quick, and experienced defensively. North dropped only one league game, to Inglewood, last year and finished in second place in the Bay League. The Saxons went into the CIF finals where El Rancho, which eventually wound up in second place, took a hard-earned victory.

Levy expects a strong passing attack with the return of quarterback Norm Dow. Bolstering Saxon hopes is the expected return of Carey Hubert, out most of last year with a leg injury.

Three vital linemen will be returning in the persons of left tackle Paul Haman, guard Rich Parker, and left end Pete Estrada.

Keggas Pick For Crown

Gunning for their second tournament win of the year, the Tappa Keggas will oppose 16 teams in this weekend's Southern California Municipal Athletic Federation tourney in Torrance. Two teams from Torrance, four from Gardena, two from West Covina and Santa Ana, and one club from

Redondo, Hawthorne, Riverside, El Monte, Whittier, and Long Beach will oppose the Keggas.

Once again the Tappas are rated in the favorite's role. Recently they shut out four straight foes to garner the crown on the West Coast Slo-Pitch Tournament.

THE LONG BEACH Youngbloods, finalists against the Keggas two weeks ago, are entered in the play offs. Long Beach dropped a 6-0 nod to the local outfit.

Last year, the Keggas won the SCMAF title, the Gardena championship, and captured the Los Angeles County title.

THEY APPEAR capable of matching their past achievements this time around.

Against West Coast Slo-Pitch League competition, the Tappa Keggas dropped only one contest, to the Gardena Bulls. The Bulls are not entered in the SCMAF tourney, but were whipped in the semi-finals of the Redondo classic.

Matchless power and pitching are synonymous with the Tappa Keggas.

CHUCK RYAN and Bryan Stephens form the mound corps. Ryan is undefeated this year, while Stephens has dropped only one tilt.

Ray Magnante, selected the most valuable player in the Redondo Tournament, and all-stars Chuck Schoendienst, Gib Matthews, and Mick Ryan supply the bulk of the Keggas power.

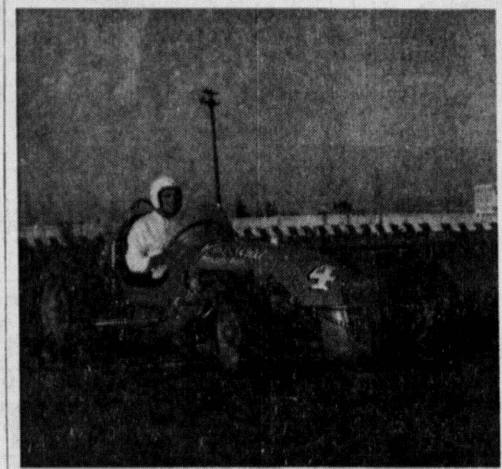
