

Liquor, Clothing Taken by Thieves

Bottled liquor and fall fashions were taken by thieves last weekend in separate burglaries in Torrance.

Schwartz Men's Store, 1505 Cabrillo Ave., reported the theft of clothing valued at \$1,000 over the weekend. The thieves gained entry by forcing open the rear door of the American Barbershop next door and cutting a hole in the wall between the two establishments.

THE BURGLARS tried on clothing and tried to open a safe in the men's store, but

nothing was reported missing in the barbershop.

A restaurant at 23863 Hawthorne Blvd., was burglarized for about \$2,000 in bottled liquors Monday evening. The haul netted the thieves from 300 to 400 bottles.

THE THEFT was discovered by an employee, Arthur Bardshaw, when he opened the restaurant for business Tuesday morning. The building had been locked by the bartender at 2 a.m.

A cigarette machine, a juke box, and a cash register were also rifled, netting the thieves an additional \$700.

Owner of the restaurant was identified as Robert Mimura, 32, of 20914 Tomilee Ave.

Lynn replied heatedly, "I wish you would have come up with this money at the last tax over-ride."

"You will have to come back with another over-ride and I will not buy it," Lynn exclaimed.

RECALLING HIS role as a former teacher, Dr. Hull explained to the Board that their purpose was not only one of economy, but a "wise expenditure of funds for the welfare of the students and the community."

Custodial employees also stepped in to pick up night pay differential from the trustees. The employees asked for a five per cent differential, but were met with a counter offer of one per cent by Lynn.

"I want the budget to be able to absorb it. The differential will eventually reach five per cent anyway," Lynn said.

Compromising, the board decided on a two per cent differential.

LESS THAN one-half of the classified employees work at night, but 90 per cent of the custodial service is done in the evening.

The night pay will cost approximately \$14,000.

The trustees decided to wait until a full board was present before acting on the salaries of the superintendent and his consultants. Member William Boswell was absent Monday night.

THE MATTER of the upper echelon salaries had been set aside when the Board approved the three per cent blanket raise.

In other action, the Trustees heard a report on a group health insurance program for the district, but voted to table the matter pending further information.

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn sponsored the proclamation. The motion urged all motorists to drive with their car headlights on during the weekend — in both daytime and evening hours — to call attention to safety on the highways.

"Last year," noted Hahn, "Los Angeles County residents cooperated in the first campaign of this type, and only three persons died in traffic during the Labor Day weekend here." In 1960, the death toll was 14.
