

Enrollment Information For City Schools Given

The first day of school scheduled for the 30,000 students in the 37 Torrance elementary and high schools will be Wednesday, Sept. 12. Freshman orientation at each of the four high schools will take place on Tuesday, Sept. 11, the day before school formally opens. Adult education classes are scheduled to begin in Monday evening, Sept. 17.

The following orientation schedules have just been released by the administrative officers of the Torrance Unified School District.

Registration for students new to the Torrance Unified School District or new to any of the four high schools will be held now through Sept. 5. Registration for elementary students new to the district will begin Sept. 4 at the elementary schools involved.

NEW STUDENTS registering (all such students must be accompanied by a parent or guardian) should report to the

counseling office of the high school in which they are to enroll between the hours of 9:00 a.m.—12:00 noon and 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. on one of the dates listed above. All new students are urged to register early so that they will be able to be programmed and scheduled into the classes they desire.

Each new student must bring a birth certificate and evidence of compliance with the California state regulations regarding the new law for polio immunization.

TORRANCE HIGH SCHOOL

All students new to Torrance High School should report to the temporary administrative offices located in the girls' gymnasium. Signs will be posted.

AUG. 29-SEPT. 5—9 a.m. to noon, 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. Registration and counseling of new high school students. (girls' gym)

SEPT. 11—8 a.m. All freshmen should report to the audi-

torium to receive class schedules and orientation.

SEPT. 12—7:45 a.m. All new students not previously registered should report to the auditorium.

7:45 a.m. All sophomores report to the Sophomore Patio, located between the main building and the science building.

7:45 a.m. All juniors report to the upper tennis court area.

7:45 a.m. All seniors report to senior patio.

8 a.m. All freshmen having completed orientation and in possession of class schedules should report to their first period class promptly at 8 a.m.

AFTER receiving class schedules at the designated areas above, all students should report to their respective first period class, which will begin promptly at 8 a.m.

SOUTH HIGH SCHOOL

AUG. 29-SEPT. 5—9 a.m. to noon, 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. All students new to South High

School should report to the counseling offices for registration.

SEPT. 11—1:15 p.m. Freshman orientation. All freshmen report to the gymnasium.

SEPT. 12—8 a.m. All students (9-12) report to the gymnasium.

WEST HIGH SCHOOL

AUG. 29-SEPT. 5—9 a.m. to noon, 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. All students new to West High School not previously registered report to the counseling offices for programming and class schedules.

SEPT. 11—8 a.m. Freshman orientation. All freshmen report to the patio of the instructional building. Signs will be posted. Student guides will be furnished.

SEPT. 12—9 a.m. Elementary students report to their respective elementary schools for first day of school.

All adults planning to earn a high school diploma must report to the temporary adults education counseling offices located at the girls' gymnasium at Torrance High School between the hours of 12:30

NORTH HIGH SCHOOL

AUG. 29-SEPT. 5—9 a.m. to noon, 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. All students new to North High School not previously regis-

tered report to the counseling offices for registration and class scheduling.

SEPT. 11—8 a.m. Freshmen orientation. All freshmen report to the gymnasium.

SEPT. 12—8 a.m. All students (9-12) report to the cafeteria to receive class schedules.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

SEPT. 4-5—9 a.m. to noon, 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. All students new to elementary schools involved register at the principal's office.

SEPT. 12—9 a.m. Elementary students report to their respective elementary schools for first day of school.

ADULT EDUCATION

All adults planning to earn a high school diploma must report to the temporary adults education counseling offices located at the girls' gymnasium at Torrance High School between the hours of 12:30

p.m. and 4:30 p.m., Sept. 6 and 7 or during the hours of 12:30 p.m. and 9 p.m. on Sept. 10-14.

Students not working toward a high school diploma will register in the classroom at the first session attended. Because of limitation in size of some classes, when maximum enrollment is reached a waiting list will be started and students will be notified when they may attend.

ADULT EDUCATION

class schedules may be obtained from the following sources:

Adult education office, girls' gymnasium, Torrance High School, recreation areas, administrative building, Torrance Unified School District, 2335 Plaza Del Amo, Y.W.C.A., Torrance public libraries, principal's office of all high and elementary schools, or industrial relations offices of major industrial plants.

District. Courses completed satisfactorily offer credit toward a high school diploma. Credit may also be granted for various kinds of work experience.

All students working toward a high school diploma must register in the adult education offices at the beginning of each semester.

Any person 18 years of age or older who is not now attending a high school may enroll.

A 50-cent incidental fee is collected from all students.

A TUITION fee of \$3 per course, per semester will be charged each student for each non-academic subject offered. Tuition fee will not be charged for (1) short term (four meetings or less) lecture series classes; (2) students under 21 or over 65 years of age; (3) English or citizenship classes for the foreign born; (4) or classes required for the pur-

pose of obtaining a high school diploma.

Students not attending classes regularly will be dropped. Classes may be closed if attendance averages less than 18 in any school month.
