Local Firms Get \$770,000 In Contracts

Two Torrance firms have been awarded contracts totaling more than \$770,000 by Lockheed Missiles and Space Co. at Sunnyvale.

Space Equipment Corp. was awarded a \$26,000 contract for its Kerr Products Division for plastic szdellite nose cones, while a \$745,000 contract for a motor pump assembly was awarded Vickers, Inc.

The contracts were awarded to the firms in keeping with Lockheed's policy to sub-con-tract work to small firms in areas where a labor surplus is present. Both contract orders are for parts for the Polaris Missiles Systems.


