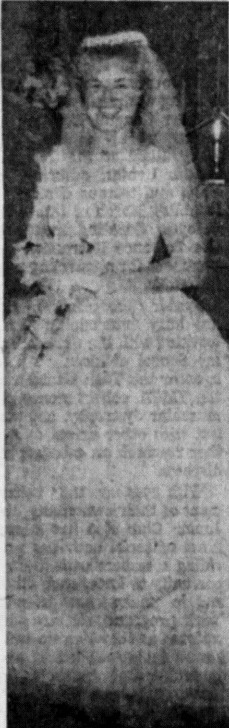
Begin Year
