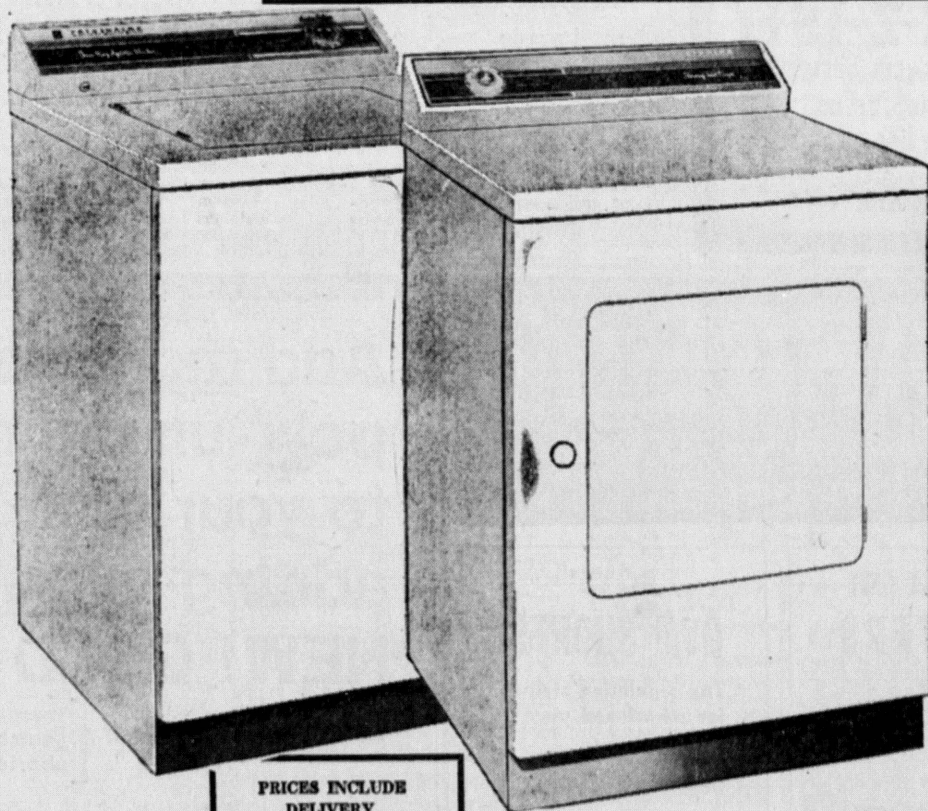
Round dancing, as well as square dancing, will be taught. The lessons will continue for 20 weeks at which time graduation will be held. The public is invited.
