Winner of Pep Boys Scholarship Named

James R. Crowley of Tarzana today was announced as winner of the 10th Annual Pep Boys Four-Year Engineering Scholarship. The award pays for all tuition, books and supplies at any California state college or university. Crowley will attend San Luis Obispo California State Polytechnic College. Objectives of the scholarship competition, according to Murray Rosenfeld, chairman of the scholarship committee, is "to create a greater awareness of the need for traffic safety and to encourage youth to come forward with practical solutions to the problem."

The award was officially presented to Crowley by Murray Rosenfeld, executive vice president and general manager of the Pep Boys Auto Supply Stores in a ceremony at Pep Boys' general offices in Los Angeles. Also attending was Joseph Kaplan, general manager of the Los Angeles Chapter of the National Safety Council.

CROWLEY, who resides at 4771 Topeka Drive, Tarzana, was an honor student at William Taft High School, and was graduated last June. He won the scholarship in competition with high school students throughout Central and Southern California. The award was made to Crowley on the basis of his essay on traffic safety, his score on an engineering aptitude examination, and high school scholastic standing.

Plans are now being formulated for Pep Boys' 1963 scholarship competition. This objective is accomplished by requiring students to write essays on the subject of, "What I Would Do to Prevent Accidents and Save Lives." The judging committee, composed of representatives from the California Highway Patrol, Los Angeles Traffic Court, UCLA, and the National Safety Council, was most complimentary concerning the ideas and suggestions contained in the essays submitted, said Rosenfeld.
