Champagne will be served at 2:30 and the fashion parade will begin at 3 p.m. with Miss Catherine Wueste, Broadway's fashion coordinator, as commentator. Professionals will model and children of members will display the new fashions for the young miss. Carrying out the theme of the show, new fashions will be modeled in sequences entitled "Masterpiece Fabrics," "Modern Art in Dress Silhouettes," "Artistry in Costumes," "Art of the Casual," and "Art for Everyone . . . Knits."

Other sequences will be "Art of Evening Elegance," "Framed in Fur," "Designers are Artists . . . Season of the Coats," and "Fall Paints a New Suit Picture."

Masterpieces in fabrics will include new giant mohairs, airy souffles, porous printed wools, diagonals and ottomans, alaskine, bold plaids,

color-shot weaves, luxury fabrics and knits.

Dress Silhouette

The modern art in the dress silhouette is the "spare" look, pure shape, more compact, slimmer, included in tunics, rajah, princess, shifts, overblouse look, a la empire and coat dress. Designer artistry in the costume look has the dress standing alone with a long coat plus dress, 7/8 coat plus dress and the rajah coat plus dress, creating a new fashion look in costumes for 1962.

A big part of the California fashion scene is the "art for everyone—knits" which must be eye-appealing. The knit interest includes suede and fur trims, embroidery and beads and even gilded for evening.

A bonanza of fur trims on coats, suits and dresses is being heralded in fall fashion picture. Furs include mink, leopard, Persian lamb, sable and beaver collars; also little fur pieces on millinery, hems and sleeves.

As Fall paints a new suit picture the fashion lies in the

skirts, which must be interesting. The Balenciaga classic is a favorite as well as fur trimmed and rajah cut suits. Skirts have gores, panels, pleats and match box.

Evening Elegance

The Art of Evening Elegance will be the glittering finale for the parade of fashions in chic creations of brocades, blisters, matlase, cut velvet, crepe, satin, lace, silver lame, sequined and beaded fabrics. The new low barebacks will be featured in the after-five look for fall and the "big look" in evening clothes will be emphasized in long, slim evening dresses, evening coats, and dazzle dresses pointing up the "craze for gold."

A highlight of the show will be the visit of a noted American shoe designer, Seymour Troy, who will be spending the day in the Better Shoe Department at the Broadway.

English County clothes will be the costume for the evening as guests come direct from the show ring.
