All music educators in the area are cordially invited to this lecture workshop. Further information may be obtained by calling Shirley Everhart or Gertrude Lumsden.

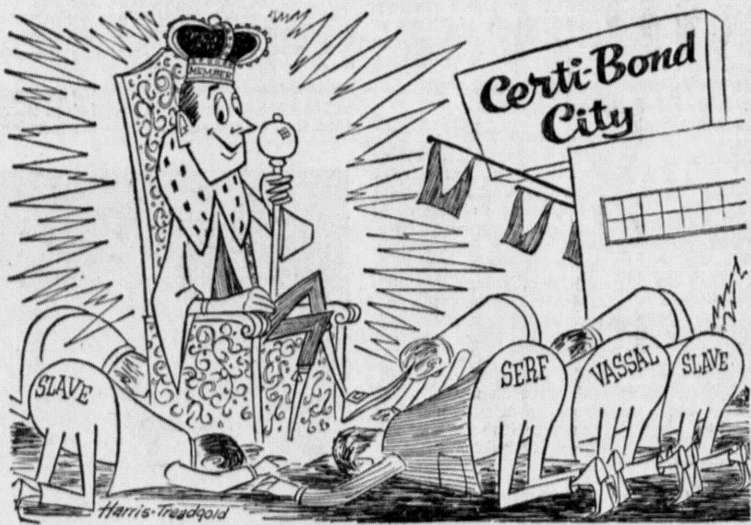
