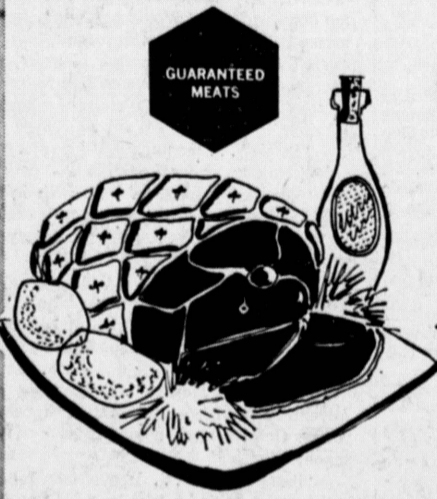

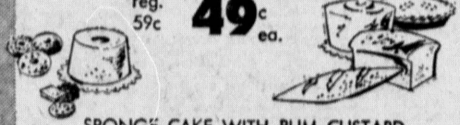

MAGIC CHEF

Sight & Sound

HOLLYWOOD—The regular weekly programs, most of which have now started their 39 week engagement in our living rooms, will probably run the gamut from bad to very good. But TV's finest hours, the excellent presentations that bring excitement to television, will be the specials sprinkled liberally throughout the season.

There's much to look forward to this year in drama, music, public affairs and variety that should add a degree of distinction to the season. Here are a few.

The Hallmark Hall of Fame returns for its 12th season on NBC in late October with John Patrick's Teahouse of the August Moon, starring John Forsythe, David Wayne, and Miyoshi Umeki. In December Hallmark presents Cyrano de Bergerac with Christopher Plummer and Hope Lang.

INGRID BERGMAN returns to TV on CBS with Sir Michael Redgrave in Henrik Ibsen's Hedda Gabler, DuPont's Show of the Week will emphasize original drama throughout the season.

One of the musical highlights on TV will be an original 90 minute live musical drama composed by Leonard Bernstein on commission from the Ford Motor Company, scheduled for April of 1963. Bernstein will also conduct four Young Peoples Concerts during prime evening time on CBS. The world premiere of a new opera by Gian Carlo Menotti and the first complete TV presentation of Bach's St. Matthew Passion are part of the NBC Opera Co. schedule, which also includes repeats of three productions of past seasons.

TWO SEGMENTS of Walt Disney's Wonderful World of Color, entitled the Magnificent Rebel, will deal with the middle 15 years of Beethoven's life and feature his musical compositions.

Information specials and actualities are being given increased attention this year. NBC, for example, has scheduled 50 major news and informational specials treating subjects such as the Arizona desert, the heritage of Shakespeare, a full-scale review of communism, a study of adoption, and many others.

A Tour of Monaco with Princess Grace is set for CBS in February, and programs of "dialogues" between outstanding people such as last summer's Dialogues of Archibald Macleish and Mark Van Doren are also planned by CBS. NBC's "World of . . ." and starts out with the World of Jacqueline Kennedy and the World of Benny Goodman. Project 20 has scheduled The American Indian, a documentary to be done in the manner of its widely acclaimed The Real West, which starred Gary Cooper.

IN THE FIELD of comedy and variety we'll see six Bob Hope Specials, the first on Oct. 24, with Bing Crosby, Lucille Ball and Juliet Prowse as guest. Carol Burnett will do a 90 minute special of Calamity Jane for CBS, and Arthur Godfrey will star in three one hour specials, the first on Nov. 10. Danny Kaye also returns in November for his sole appearance on TV this year. ABC has signed Sid Caesar for nine half hour specials starting in October, and in February NBC re-plays Peter Pan with Mary Martin.

EVEN IF the new weekly programs such as Jackie Gleason, Lucille Ball, Jack Paar, The Virginian, Going My Way, The 11th Hour, and many others don't live up to expectations or if we become a little jaded with them in a few months, there'll be an ample selection of special endeavors such as those above to give us some interesting TV viewing. There's at least a little bit for everyone ahead.

Law in Action

Children hurt at school are not as a rule its responsibility unless at fault for defective or dangerous equipment, or for lack of supervision.

As a rule a child hurt by another child cannot recover damages from the parents or school unless there was improper supervision. A slip of a bat, a badly thrown ball or another child running yours down is seldom grounds for holding the school to blame. It depends upon all the facts.

Apart from the school, the child, of course, can be held responsible for the harm he does.

IN ONE CASE a 97-pound eighth grader was hurt at touch football in trying to block a 147-pound seventh grader. In the first aid room his teacher saw the eighth grader bleeding and sent him home. It turned out that the boy had a serious spleen and kidney injury.

The child and his parents blamed the school, but the court found it not to blame. According to the court touch football is not in itself dangerous; the teacher acted reasonably in sending the child home. There was no negligence in the teacher's delaying the medical treatment.

Another student got hurt trying a dive in a tumbling class. The jury had to say whether the diving was inherently dangerous. If not, the teacher was not at fault in allowing him to do so.

BUT THE school is sometimes to blame. A teacher should know of dangerous things going on in his class and do something about them.
