Voters Asked for Comments on Cuba

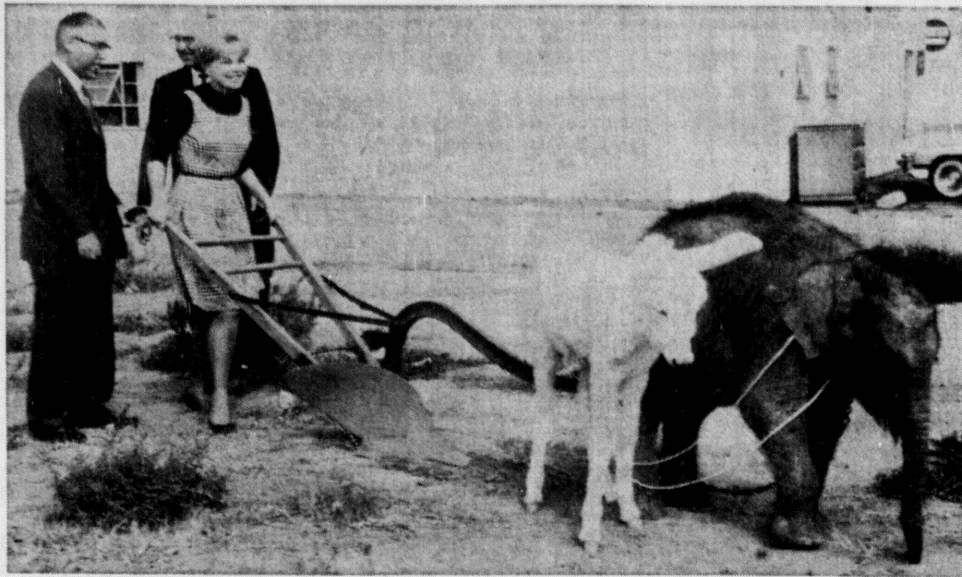
Commenting that, "more mail has been received in my Washington office on the question of Cuba and the Monroe Doctrine than on any other single issue during either session of the 87th Congress" Representative Alphonzo Bell (R-Santa Monica) has announced that the entire questionnaire section of his current congressional newsletter would deal with the Cuban problem.

Question on which 28th District constituents would be asked to give "Yes," "No," or "Undecided" responses included:

1. Do you believe the United States should impose a naval and air blockade on Cuba?
2. Do you believe the United States should follow a policy of non-intervention in Cuban-Russian military commerce?
3. Do you believe the United States should impose a naval armed military invasion of the Cuban mainland?
4. Do you believe past and present U. S. policy on Cuba is a fair subject for public debate in the months ahead?
5. Do you believe the United States should urge Western nations to terminate economic relations with Cuba?
6. Do you support a policy of uncommitted watchful waiting concerning the Cuban-Russian military build-up?

Congressman Bell stated that first tabulations of the questionnaire returns would be made public in mid-October.

Know Your Traffic Laws

Radar as used in traffic enforcement is the subject of many comments by the driving public most of which are not complimentary. These beliefs are based upon opinion and bias rather than fact of what radar enforcement can do for a community. In Torrance, radar has been used for more than two years and the traffic accident rate has shown a decline in spite of our rapid growth.

It would be incorrect to say that radar has been the sole reason for this decline but radar has played an important role in accident prevention as well as reduction. Many factors such as selective enforcement coupled with proper application, engineering changes such as increased number of traffic signals and changes in speed zones, education of the driving public such as is found in newspapers are involved. Perhaps most important of all is the public's acceptance of our city's traffic laws and traffic program.

who knew if they continued to drive fast they also would be caught. Radar was responsible for making all of us more conscious of watching our speedometers, making sure we did not speed and violate our speed laws. This overall reduction in speed prevented many accidents from happening because this reduced speed made stopping in time easy or possible rather than impossible. This reduced speed also reduced the severity of injury to those who were in traffic accidents.

THIS IS FACT not opinion. This is what radar enforcement has done for you this past two years and will continue to do for the protection of all of us. Radar is just a part of a cooperative effort to keep you alive and well. Our city streets and highways have no room for those who choose to endanger our lives by speeding and creating a hazard that is a menace to you and your children.

AN EXAMPLE of the type progress that is being made in our city towards making Torrance a safer community is that for the first eight months of 1959 there was a total of 1098 traffic accidents and for the first eight months of this year there have been 778 traffic accidents. This is a reduction of 310 traffic accidents for the same period.

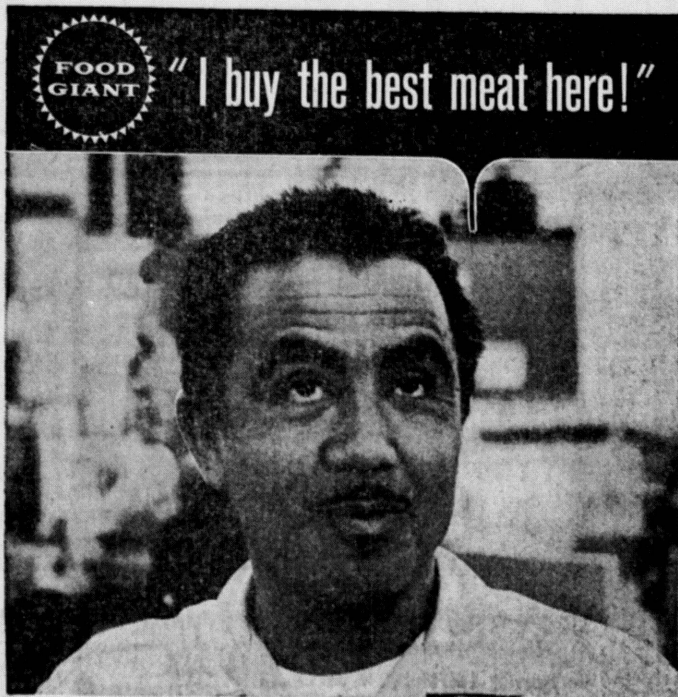
Now consider the increased population from 1959 to this year. When a city can show this type of decrease in traffic accidents particularly in a fast growing area such as Southern California this indicates real progress.

According to statistics 85 per cent of the cars on our roads are being driven in a safe and sane manner while 15 per cent are violating traffic laws and are responsible for our deaths and injuries as a result of traffic accidents. It's this 15 per cent that must be stopped before they kill or injure. Support your traffic program by obeying all traffic laws and support strict enforcement. Radar enforcement is one way of reaching this 15 per cent before you become a victim of this group. Before you form an opinion of radar enforcement check the facts not the opinion of a friend. Many drivers cited by radar are now better drivers because of the citation they received and now are careful rather than careless.

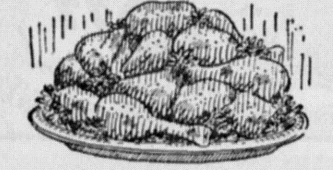

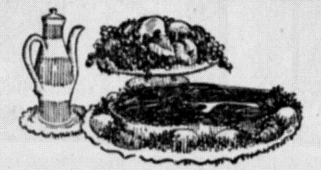

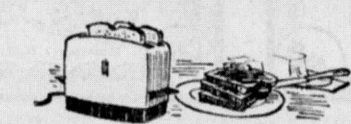

CDR. RICHARD O'KANE

COMMANDER RICHARD H. O'KANE INTREPID SKIPPER OF SUBMARINE TANG WAS "TOP" AT SINKING ENEMY SHIPS. HIS RECORD—24 SHIPS FOR A TOTAL OF 93,824 TONS. IN 1944, WHILE SURFACED, HE ADDED THREE MORE TO HIS RECORD. THEN HIS LUCK RAN OUT. HIS LAST "FISH" WAS FAULTY, MADE A CIRCULAR RUN AND BLASTED TANG OUT OF THE WATER. O'KANE AND EIGHT CREWMEN WERE HURLED FROM THE SUB'S BRIDGE. O'KANE WAS RESCUED ONLY TO BE THROWN INTO AN ENEMY PRISON CAMP. IN 1946 FOR HIS "GALLANTRY IN ACTION" O'KANE RECEIVED THE CONGRESSIONAL MEDAL OF HONOR.
