

Taxpayers Group Urges 'Yes' on Proposition A

Unqualified endorsement of Proposition "A"—the \$17 million Juvenile Facilities bond issue on the Nov. 6 ballot—was given Saturday by the Property Owners Tax Assn. of California.

Paul Sheedy, executive vice president of the tax group, announced the action taken by the association in a directive to Supervisors Ernest E. Debs and Kenneth Hahn, co-chairmen of the "Yes" on "A" Committee, campaigning for an overwhelming affirmative vote on the proposal at the polls next month.

"Approval of the bond issue is the most feasible and economical method of financing the needed facilities demanded to be constructed as soon as possible by the County Grand Jury," Sheedy stated.

"THE DETENTION and placement facilities will be in use for many years and the taxpayers of today should not be required to shoulder the entire burden of the cost," Sheedy underlined. "By approving Proposition 'A', the cost will be shared proportionately between the present taxpayers and future residents of the county, with the bonds being repaid in part each year."

"If Proposition 'A' is rejected by the electorate, then the Juvenile Facilities development becomes a general tax fund expenditure—much more costly to the taxpayer," Sheedy warned.

THE GRAND JURY demanded construction of the facilities to remedy the intolerable, overcrowded conditions which force youngsters in need of help and guidance to sleep on the floor at the Main Juvenile Hall and other detention placement centers.

Proposition "A", requiring a two-thirds vote margin for approval, will provide:

1. San Fernando Valley Juvenile Hall at Sylmar, a 400-bed institution to be construct-

ed on a site already acquired, representing the No. 1 construction project in the county. It will include court facilities as well as a clinic and infirmary for both boys and girls.

2. ADDITIONAL facilities at MacLaren Hall, El Monte, for non-delinquent children. A complete medical unit will be included to care for abandoned infants and youngsters abused and neglected by their parents.

3. An additional school for girls to be constructed adjacent to the existing Las Palmas School for Girls, consisting of 96 beds permitting adequate placement for over half the girls detained at Main Juvenile Hall.

4. A diagnostic and intensive treatment unit of 120 beds at Main Juvenile Hall, greatly needed to provide medical and psychological assistance for boys with severe behavior problems, along with replacement of obsolete and hazardous buildings.

5. A 400-bed Juvenile Hall in the Southwest to provide court and detention facilities closer to the community centers in the fast-growing southwestern section of the county.

4. Many cool-season vegetables are available as seedling transplants in nurseries. Onion seed may be sown now also for next summer's crop.

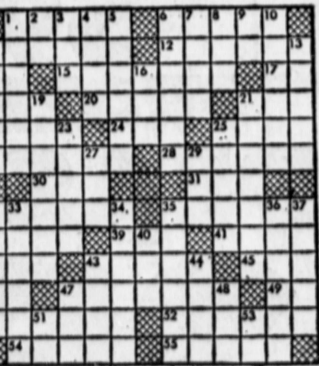
5. Mulch around shrubs with a generous layer of steer manure.
