# Special Session 'Calls' In Hands of the Governor

Legislature begins on the first mendation on one piece of Monday in January of an oddnumbered year, such as 1963. The first Monday of 1963 is Jan. 7, and that is when we expect to convene. Legislators leave home and go to Sacra-mento a few days in advance in order to organize their offices, hence all mail to members of the Assembly or State Sena tors should be addressed to the State Capitol, Sacramento 14, Calif., after Jan. 1.

Because of the tense international situation, the Gover nor of the State of California can exercise his authority to call the Legislature into Specall Tession at any time and on very short notice. When the governor issues what is tech-nically known as a "Call" for a Special Session, he states in broad, general terms the sub-jects which will be on the agenda, but he does not specithe numbers or authors of e bills to be considered.

WHEN THE Governor calls a Special Session and lists the subjects on the agenda, he can later add other subjects for the Special Session. A Special Session can be "called" at any time, but it is "called" ut any time, but it is "called" ut Session can be "called" at any time, but if it is "called" during the long, regular General Session of 1963, or the short, Budget Session of an evennumbered year (such as 1962, 1964, etc.), the Special Session runs concurrently with the General Session or the Special Session, as the case may be. In other words, in 1963, the Governor can bring us to Sac-Governor can bring us to Sacramento ahead of Jan. 7 if he wishes and he can announce a Special Session to run concurrently with the General Session of 1963, which normally should end about June 15.

However, if there is a Special Session running concurrently with the long General Session of 1963 and if we do not comof 1963 and if we do not complete the work of the Special Session by the day the General Session must end in accordance with the State Constitution, we must remain in session in Sacramento until the Special Session agenda is finished.

THE ABOVE statements may seem involved and complicated but they are correct and apply regardless of who is Governor. Briefly, I believe we shall go into the General Session on In 7 and adjourn to come Jan. 7 and adjourn to come home about the middle of June, but not being a fortune-teller, I must admit that anything can happen during a tense situation.


