The claim that the presence of oil wells worked against the site considered in Torrance was refuted by Mrs. Watts who pointed out the many other oil field sites which had been built up by commercial and residential developers.

A detailed study of the Torrance sites along with statistical information on all pertinent matters in connection with the

establishment of a major college has been under preparation by City Attorney Stanley Remelmeier for several weeks and will be presented to the Board of Trustees for their consideration in selecting the site.

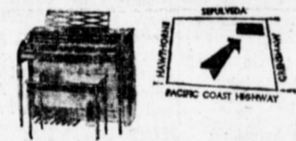
