Holiday Froth Punch

2 cans frozen pineapple-grapefruit juice concen-trate, softened
2 cans frozen lemonade concentrate, softened
1 quart club soda, chilled
1 quart gingerale, chilled quart gingerale, chilled

2 pints raspberry sherbert Ice cubes Pour softened juice con-centrate into punch bowl. Add club soda and gingerale

Add club soda and gingerale with about I quart ice cubes. Stir in raspberry sherbert until well blended.

Set punch bowl in a large roasting pan filled with fern fronds, half fill pan with water. Using tongs (not hands, add 4 chunks of dry ice to the water, not punch.
