There is also the tremendous task of caring for the individuals who are incapacitated by these and other chronic illnesses which range from arthritis to schizo-

Somewhat paradoxically it seems, we are told that there is more disease today than in that period of time when the population was younger and when diphtheria, smallpox, whooping cough, typhoid fever, tuberculosis and similar diseases were commonplace, and when infant and maternal seases were commonplace, and when infant and maternal deaths were shockingly numerous. What has happened, of course, is that people now live to an age when illness rates are usually very high and when sickness is of long duration rather than acute and brief.

MANY communities are just beginning to realize that avail-able personnel and hospital facilities to care for the chronically ill and disabled are either sadly inadequate or do not exist, and that co-ordinate home care programs, which provide a complete service for the chronically ill at home, are exceedingly rare. Since the population over 40 is steadily increasing, the problem will become even more critical unless ways are found to prevent. less ways are found to prevent many of the diseases now com-mon to the older age group.

Communities must therefore develop health resources that will provide the means for early detection and care of di-sease in order to halt, insofar as possible, the progress of the chronic diseases and the disabilities that are so often in-curred. This, in considered medical opinion, is the very least that must be done.

SUCH MEASURES, it is suggested, might include wider use of multiphasic screening for a number of the more se rious disabling disorders, the increased use of cytological examinations in cancer detection, aminations in career detection, the establishment of "well adult clinics" to keep people well by finding and correcting deviations from good health be-fore lasting harm is done, and the teaching of good health habits including the importance of proper nutrition.

It would be better still, of course, if such disabling diseases could be prevented from occurring at all, but most chronic diseases, sad to say, are not yet preventable.

Considerable picneer work, experimentations, and demon-strations must be undertaken strations must be undertaken to find the best way of providing these needed health services and facilities Fortunately, the Community Health Service and Facilities Act passed by Congress in 1961, provided the needed funds in the form of matching grants, and there is matching grants, and there is every indication that community health services will now hity health services will now begin to widen and irprove.
