service, swimming and survival, first aid and basic ship-board routine.

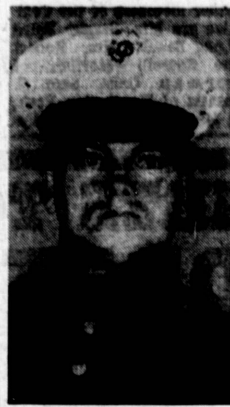

Injury Court Case Change Contemplated

The County Board of Supervisors has ordered that a plan proposing the biggest change in the county court system since the reorganization of 1951 be put before the State Legislature for action in 1963.

The plan, to be included in the county's 1963 legislative program, calls for the use of three-member lawyer-arbitration boards to hear personal injury cases.

THE PROGRAM was formulated by a special "Blue Ribbon" study commission on judicial procedures headed by Attorney Richard L. Oliver.

It is now under study by the Los Angeles County and State Bar Assns., and Supervisor Kenneth Hahn said that by the time the 1963 Legislature convenes the plan is expected to have full support of both attorneys' groups.

Hahn pointed out that there is a 19½-month backlog of cases awaiting trial in Superior Court. "If this plan can be put into effect in 1963, the backlogs of cases can be virtually eliminated by 1965, Hahn said. "It will save the taxpayers at least \$6 million annually."

THE BASIC plan is as follows:

1. During periods of calendar congestion, the presiding judge, at his discretion, could refer some of the cases for hearings by hearing boards composed of three lawyers each.
2. After hearing the evidence, a hearing board would recommend to the parties and to the court what, in its opin-

ion, the judgement should be in the case.

3. If all parties accepted the board's recommendation, the court could enter a judgment accordingly, and no trial would be required.

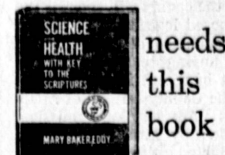
4. Any party not accepting the board's recommendation could have the case restored to the trial calendar and proceed to trial in the usual way.

"We must find a means to speed up justice without burdening the taxpayers by continually adding more court-houses and judges," Hahn added.
