PUC Says Users Must Get Savings

The California Public Utili-ties Commission today an-nounced that it has taken acnounced that it has taken ac-tion which ultimately will re-quire all utilities and trans-portation companies under its jurisdiction to pass on to rate-payers any savings in income tax resulting from the invest-ment tax credits provided for in the Internal Revenue Act of

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ment tax credits provided for in the Internal Revenue Act of 1962.
George G. Grover, commission president, said the principle is the same as that applied with regard to accelerated depreciation. It establishes accounting procedures designed counting procedures designed to assure that any reduction in taxes will flow through to the benefit of utility customers.

NO CALCULATION can be made of the effect of the investment tax credits at this time, Grover said, but several million dollars ultimately may be involved. The amounts ac-cruing to regulated companies may prevent rate increases in future by providing additional earnings, but whether it might result in any rate decreases cannot immediately be deter-

mined, Grover said.

The Internal Revenue Act of 1962 provides a three per cent tax credit for utilities and a seven per cent tax credit for other companies, including transportation companies, on property put into service after Jan. 1, 1962, "excluding build-ings and their structural components." The tax credit can be taken only on equipment and other property with a life of four years or more.
