Figures released at Mon-day's Board of Education meeting show Torrance probably gets more for its educational dollar than 32 other school districts in the county. The figures were compiled by the County Superintendent of

chools.

Torrance boasts the least ex-Torrance boasts the least expensive cost per pupil of 33 school districts in regard to average daily attendance figures. The county average per pupil is \$472.46 per year, but Torrance sends its approximately 30,000 students to school at an average cost of \$398.92.

Although the district spends Although the district spends considerably below the average for administration and certificated presonnel, Torrance spends considerably more than the average on textbooks.

Torrance ranks third in cost per pupil of textbooks while ranking 32 and 31 for administration.

average daily attendance, Tor-rance ranks first in the county. Certificated and classified personnel both receive salaries above the average county per-
