At a series of parties during the holidays, the engagement of Miss Margaret Weir and Robert H. Bauman was announced to relatives and friends.

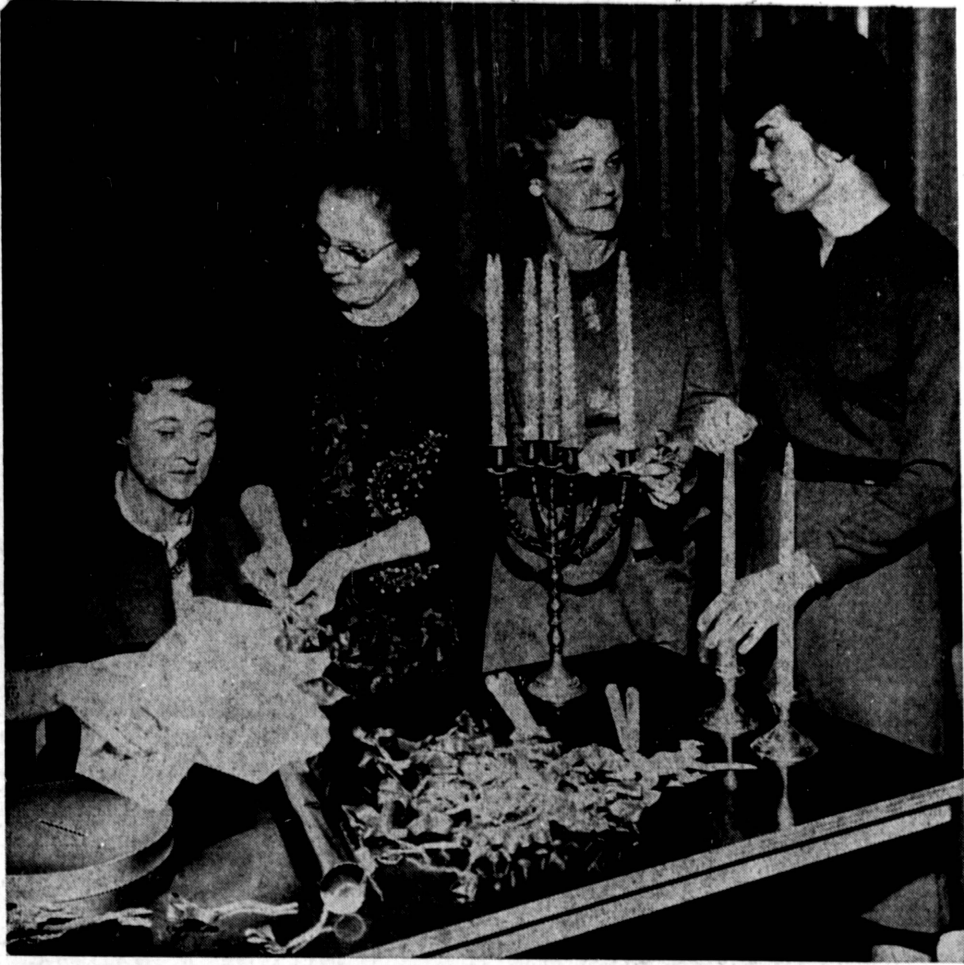
