A Closer Look

HOLLYWOOD — The new Ray Anthony Show, a live Saturday night musical variety presentation which can become an attractive offering once some rough edges are honed, is another interesting gambit on the part of KTLA (Channel 5) station manager Stretch Adler to prove that independent television stations don't have to live eternally in the shadow of the three giant networks. Any respite from old movies and tired westerns is worthy of some note.

Every evening about 80 percent of us in Southern California are tuned to one of the three network stations. The rest of us split our viewing among the remaining four independent stations which can't rely on the networks for huge blocks of instant programming. Naturally these stations get but a fraction of the audience and a small split of the advertisers' dollars. And it's no secret that most independent stations are more familiar with red than black ink.

BUT KTLA, under Adler's brisk and innovative leadership, soared from a position deep in the red to a profit of considerably over one million dollars in 1962.

What accounts for such a comeback? "There's no doubt but that our live coverage of the Bel Aire fire in 1961 gave us some impetus," Adler observed. "Most of Southern California was tuned to Channel 5 during those days to watch our coverage, which, incidentally earned us 26 awards and commendations. I think people became aware that local stations also have something to offer."

"BUT the lasting factors are these. First we got at least our share of increased advertising money available to stations."

By improved programming Adler was referring in part to the library of off-network series it has purchased, such as Peter Gunn, Cain's Hundred, Roaring Twenties and others.

"AN INDEPENDENT station is almost forced to buy some of these off-market programs, because first-run syndicated shows are non-existent today," he said.

"But at the same time we're doing more than 50 hours a week of live programming, which is probably more than any station in the country."

Steve Allen's nightly high-jinx, now syndicated to 27 stations, and the Ray Anthony Show typify KTLA's live and robust image as well as its willingness to meet the networks head-on.

KTLA IS OWNED by Paramount Pictures which also has a Pay-TV system, Telemeter, now being tested in a Toronto suburb. In addition the corporation has patented a new color TV tube, which according to Adler, affords four to five times the brightness of the current color tubes.

So although CBS, ABC, and NBC continue to dominate American television, it's heartening to see a dynamism among local stations which can help broaden our range of choice and make a profit at the same time.
