1. Feed lawns this month to give them a good start as weather warms up.

Snails and slugs are active this time of year. Scatter snail bait in strategic hiding places, such as ivy and flower borders. 3. Divide established clumps of perennial phlox

4. Try to complete bareroot planting of roses and fruit trees by the end of February. 5. Ranunsulus bulbs can still be planted. Or, if
