Circulation Of Books at Record Level

Circulation of books by the Los Angeles County Public Library system continues to gain, with January 1963 circulation of 353,346 up 65,510 from the same month in 1962, a report by County Librarian John D. Henderson reveals.

Total circulation for the seven months completed in the current fiscal year was 5, 105, 199, a gain of 151,551 over the same period in 1962.

199, a gain of 151,551 over the same period in 1962. With circulation expected to hit its annual peak in the spring months of March, April, and May, Henderson pointed out that the indications are that the total circulation for fiscal year will pass nine and a half million by a comfortable margin, and that the following year will see more than 10 million books circulated. LARGEST SINGLE category of circulation was in the field of adult non-fiction with a total of 237,170. All adult circulation reached 499,912. Children's books circulated during the month reached 353,434. Fines for overdue books in January, 1963, a mounted to Fines for overdue books in January, 1963, a mounted to \$23,610.98, up \$1,857.84 over January, 1962. Leading all of the 93 community branches in January, 1963, circulation was the West Covina Public Library, headquarters for the East San Gabriel Valley Region, with final figures of 35,907. Second was the Hawthorne Public Library, headquarters of the Centinela Region, where circulation was 32,262.
