Murray Chotiner to Address Republicans

Murray Chotiner, who has managed campaigns for several Republican candidates, will address the South Bay Young Republican Club at 8 p.m. Tuesday.

The meeting will be at the Plush Horse, on Pacific Coast Highway, and will be preceded by a social hour starting at 7 p.m.

Chotiner will discuss the Howard K. Smith television program on Richard Nixon on which Alger Hiss appeared.

He will also discuss Los Angeles County Republican leadership, and the future of the GOP.

Chotiner, a resident of the 28th Congressional District, is a past president of the Los Angeles County and state Republican assembly. He is a 20 year member of the Republican State Central Committee, serving currently on the executive and steering committees; and a former vice chairman of the County Central Committee, on which he served for 25 years.

CLARENCE "Bus" Turner, South Bay Young Republican Club president, said today: "Murray Chotiner is in the first rank among political tacticians. He directed the first campaigns of Congressman Holt, Jackson, and Lipscomb. He managed Nixon's campaign for Senate in 1950 and for vice president in 1952. In 1952 he also managed Knowland's campaign for the Senate."
