COUNCILMAN Victor E. Benstead said he would call a meeting of the Council's police commission immediately to discuss the matter, and Councilman Ross Sciarrotta backed Miller's plea, saying, "If they ask for 20 more officers, they should get 20."

Adding his support to the plea for more patrolmen was Councilman George Vico, who belittled comparative statistics on the police strength of Torrance and other Southland cities.

"I don't care what goes on in other towns," Vico said, "I'm concerned about Torrance."

CITY MANAGER Wade Peoples was less enthusiastic about substantial increases in the police department personnel, pointing out the city was understaffed in nearly every department.

"I am concerned about the crime wave, which we find is pretty universal, and I'm very much aware of the need for personnel," he said. "I'd have to defend the whole city," he added. "We need personnel everywhere."

The Council approved Miller's motion to refer the matter to the city manager for study in connection with preparation of the 1963-64 budget.
