Warrior's Marsden Does It Again

Spartans Surprise NHS Nine

Highly-rated North High received a severe jolt to its Bay League baseball hopes Tuesday as arch-rival South High gained a 3-2 victory on the loser's diamond.

South took advantage of several Saxon bobbles in the second inning to gain a lead which it never relinquished.

The Spartans pushed one more run across in the fourth frame and North was able to score only single tallies in the fourth and fifth innings.

CAGEY, fast-balling chucker Eris Spellman threw 6½ innings to gain the triumph. Spellman, a three-year mound veteran for South coach Jerry McIlvaine, gave up but one hit as he struck out nine men and allowed five free passes.

North chucker Jim Jensen went the entire route, allowing five safeties while whiffing seven men and issuing three walks.

NORTH'S INITIAL tally came in the fourth frame when Butch Nickoloff doubled, John Rance flied out as Nickoloff advanced, and Mike Jacobs walked.

Jacobs and Nickoloff attempted a double steal and the rattled South catcher threw the ball away, allowing Nickoloff to come across the plate.

IN THE FIFTH inning, Coach McIlvaine pulled Spellman out and inserted Ray Allen, a left-hander, in an attempt to save Spellman. Allen immediately gave up a walk to Joe DeLusa, a single to Carey Hubert, and a walk to Mike Brooks.

With only one man out, McIlvaine brought Spellman back in from the outfield and the left-hander quickly took command. He got Norm Dow to ground out and Nickoloff to fan, ending North's final threat.

JENSEN DESERVED a better fate. The North chucker scattered five hits, allowing only one safety in each of the final five frames.

Spellman now has a 2-0 record and has struck out 24 men, allowing but four walks in two games. Jensen has a 1-1 mark, has whiffed 15 men and issued seven walks.

IT WAS South's second straight upset victory. On Friday, the Spartans handed three-time Bay champion Morning-side a 3-1 triumph.

Today at 3 p.m., North will host Mira Costa while Santa Monica will be the guest of South High. North will face a dangerous hurler in Steve Woody. Woody has a 1-0 mark with 14 strikeouts and one walk to his credit.

North Spikers Secure First League Win

Unspectacular but consistent North High pounded out a 66-38 Bay League track victory over Hawthorne on Tuesday afternoon. It was the Saxons' first league dual meet triumph of the season.

Uncertain as to what lies ahead of them, North will trek to Inglewood at 3 p.m. tomorrow. Saxon mentor Howard Smith said Inglewood was unimpressive in the Mira Costa Relays, but pointed out that so was his own club.

In the first race of the afternoon, Hawthorne pulled out a win in the high hurdles, but from there on in the result was not in doubt.

DESPITE THE Cougar timber win, Cliff Specht and Ed Estrada kept North close with

second and third place finishes. Estrada came back to finish first in the low hurdles with a 20.8 clocking while Specht took the number three slot.

Alan Johnson and Pete Molina combined to give North the first two places in the 100-yard dash as Johnson streaked across the finish line in 10.3 seconds.

JOHNSON CRUISED through the 220-yard race in 22.6 seconds to wind up first while Molina closed in on third place.

A 55-second timing earned Dennis Bernhart a first place in the quarter mile with Bruce Allen garnering a third for the Saxons. North also captured first and third in the half mile.

Bob Hansen took top honors at 2:06 with John Buckley wind-

ing up in the show spot.

NHS MILER Harry Phillips was upset by Hawthorne in the mile, but finished second, ahead of teammate Ed Henry.

Pole vaulting is the North forte this season and Gary Barron and Dave Hubert picked off the top two spots. Barron went over at 11-6 and Hubert went out at 10-6.

THE THIRD Saxon vaulter, Dorian Hannah, was unable to clear 10-6 and was eliminated. Hannah has gone over at 12-6 this season. Barron was almost knocked out early in the proceedings. It took him the maximum three tries to go over at 9-6.

Pete Molina gave North a first in the broad jump with a

leap of 19-7. Bob Richardson earned a second at 19-2.

IN THE HIGH jump, Tim Gillibrand cleared 5-9 for first place and Dale Foth jumped high enough for third. Bill Turner and Jerry Carter took second and third in the shot put for North. Turner heaved the shot 43-10 and Carter un-wound with a 42-6 toss.

Coach Smith expressed satisfaction with his boys' performances over the hard North track.

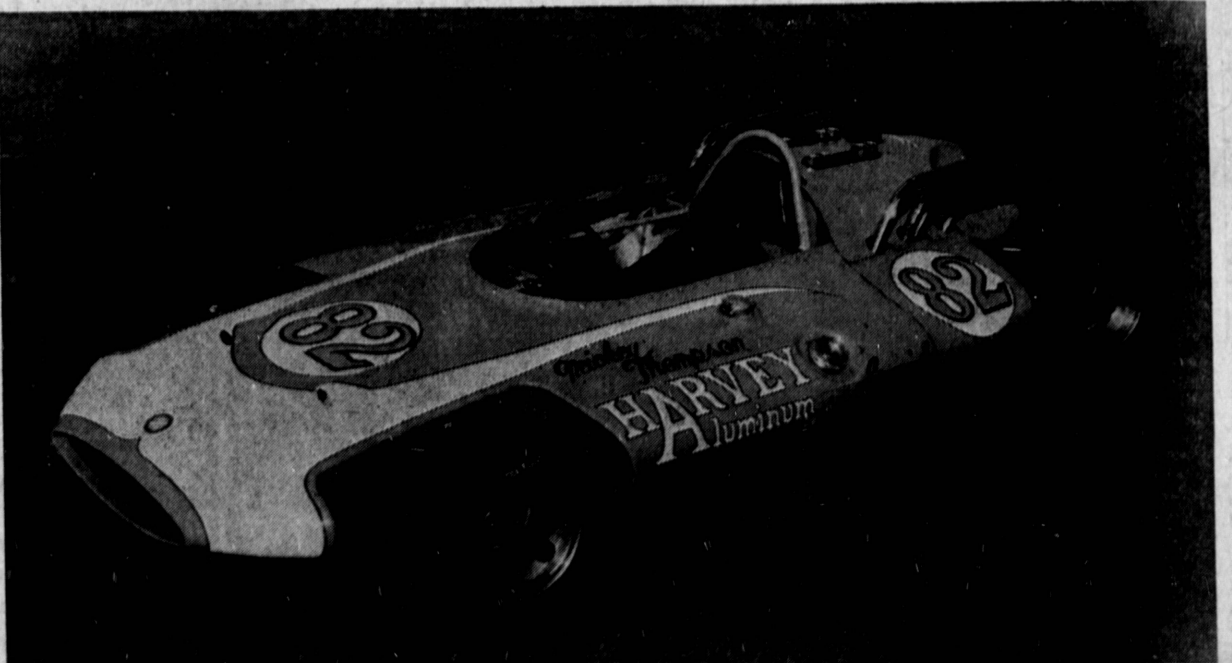
Coil, pitching all the way, whiffed 12 Eagles, allowed only one walk, and gave up the only run in the first inning as the culmination of three errors behind him.
