

"Three out of five physicians in the United States do not smoke cigarettes, and one out of four has given up cigarette smoking." Dr. Richard L. Les-coe, district education chair-man for the Centinela Valley-South Bay District of the American Cancer Society (ACS), stated recently in a re-port to local volunteers. port to local volunteers. ciety's main concern is to get the facts to the public regard-ing hazards involved in cigar-ette smoking so each person can determine whether or not to smoke, according to Dr. Les-

Non-smoking men at the age of 63 have only 23 per cent chance of dying before the age of 65, according to American Cancer Society statistics.

Cigarette smokers who use one to two packs a day have a 30 per cent chance of dying before age 65. Smokers of two or more packs have a 41 per cent chance.
