Old Family Recipes From Sicily Shared By Mrs. Jos. Russo

Truly authentic are the recipes supplied by today's guest cook, Mrs. Joseph Russo, 4703 Konya Dr. These recipes date back several generations when Mr. Russo's family lived in Sicily.

The directions for these real Italian dishes, which are enjoyed by this large family as well as guests, were given to Mrs. Russo by Mr. Russo's mother, Mrs. Jennie Russo, who this past week moved from Philadelphia, Pa., to the local Harbor Hills area.

The Russo family has lived in Torrance for the past three years, moving here from Santa Monica, where at that time, Mr. Russo was studying electronic engineering at UCLA. He is now employed as an electronic engineer with Nortronics in Palos Verdes.

In this family are six children, Steven 14, Rhonda, 13, Debora, 10, Fred, 9, Dianna, 3, and Joey, 2. The school-age children attend Victor School. Steven will enter West High in September. Mrs. Russo is active with the Victor P.T.A. Her hobbies are sewing and knitting.

"With such a large family, I don't know how to cook in small quantities, so I have given these recipes in generous proportions," stated Mrs. Russo. "However, these recipes may be divided and frozen. They are nice to have on hand especially for unexpected guests," she pointed out.

RIGATONI SAUCE

- 1 1/2 lbs. ground pork (very lean)
1 1/2 lbs. ground round
4 large onions
6 sconions (green onions)
6 cloves garlic (medium)
3 cans tomato paste
2 cans tomato sauce
2 lg. cans tomatoes
3 small bay leaves
1 can mushrooms (and juice)
1/2 tsp. red pepper
2 1/2 tsp. Italian seasoning
1 rounded tsp. fedel seed

Pan fry until brown. Drain off fat and place in large container. Fry ground round until slightly brown. Cut up onions (tops too) and saute until brown. Chop six cloves of garlic. Add this to meat mixture. Add tomato sauce, paste and broken tomatoes to meat mixture. Then add mushrooms, juice and seasonings. Cook at 15 lb. pressure in pressure cooker for 40 minutes. Makes 6 quarts.

This sauce may be frozen in quart containers and will then be available when needed. For two quarts of sauce, boil 2 lbs. of rigatoni noodles in six quarts of water, until tender. Drain and serve with sauce topped with fresh grated Parmesan cheese. Serves 8.

BRACIOLI

- 2 lbs. steak (flank or round)
fresh parsley
1 tsp. oregano
2 cups Italian bread crumbs
1/2 cup rama no cheese
1 egg
1 tbsps. olive oil
1/2 tsp. salt
pepper
1 bay leaf
1 can tomato sauce (small)
1 garlic clove
1/2 onion (chopped fine)

Mix parsley, spices, bread crumbs, cheese, onion, egg. Spread on pounded steak. Roll the meat and the filling. Secure edges by tying with string.

Brown the meat roll on all sides in oil with clove of garlic. Place roll in deep casserole, pour tomato sauce and bay leaf over roll, and two cups or cans of water over roll. Bake in 350 degree oven. When done slice in 1/2 inch slices.

ITALIAN CHICKEN MEAT BALL SOUP

- 1 3-lb. stewing chicken (cut up)
1 lb. ground round
1/2 c Parmesan cheese (grated)
1 tsp. garlic salt
3/4 lb. macaroni (shells)

Place stewing chicken pieces in 4 qts. of water plus 2 tsp. salt and 2 bay leaves. Simmer until tender about 3 1/2 hours. Bone chicken, dice and return to broth. Mix ground round, cheese, garlic salt, pepper, Italian seasoning and egg. Shape into small meat balls.

Put meat balls, frozen mixed vegetables and macaroni in broth and simmer 1/2 hour or until macaroni is tender. Skim fat with tablespoon. Add salt to taste. Makes 12 generous servings.
