Only three and a half years old, they have chalked up 9,500 hours of service. They are members of the Junior Auxiliary to the

Little Company of Mary Hospital. Girls making up the membership in this auxiliary

come from nine high schools and 22 religious faiths. Auxiliary members range in age from 15½ to 18 years and must serve four hours each week at the hospital. At present, there are 220 girls going about their duties at the hospital.

These youthful helpers can be found in pediatrics, surgical and medical floors, central supply, and kitchen. They also assist with admitting and discharging patients; entertaining, walking and feeding patients. Other duties include helping with food preparations, sterilizing gloves, cleaning rooms, making beds and running errands.

Auxiliary work has proved rewarding and beneficial as many girls during the past years have gone on to become nurses and technicians.

Vocational lectures highlight many of the meetings and there is a calendar of social activities, among them the annual fashion show, installation banquet and annual picnic. A carnival is planned for October.
