Civil Defense Medical Classes Slated Here

The Torrance Civil Defense Commission and the Torrance Memorial Hospital staff have announced plans to conduct a series of medical self-help classes beginning Oct. 2. The classes will meet for two hour sessions each Wednesday in the hospital staff room.

The medical self-help classes are part of a nation-wide program covering hygiene, water and food, shock, bleeding and bandaging, artificial respiration, fracture and sprains, burns, nursing care, and emergency childbirth procedures for use during an emergency. The program is designed to train the layman in proper emergency treatment for use when the hospitals are not

available because of natural or other disasters.

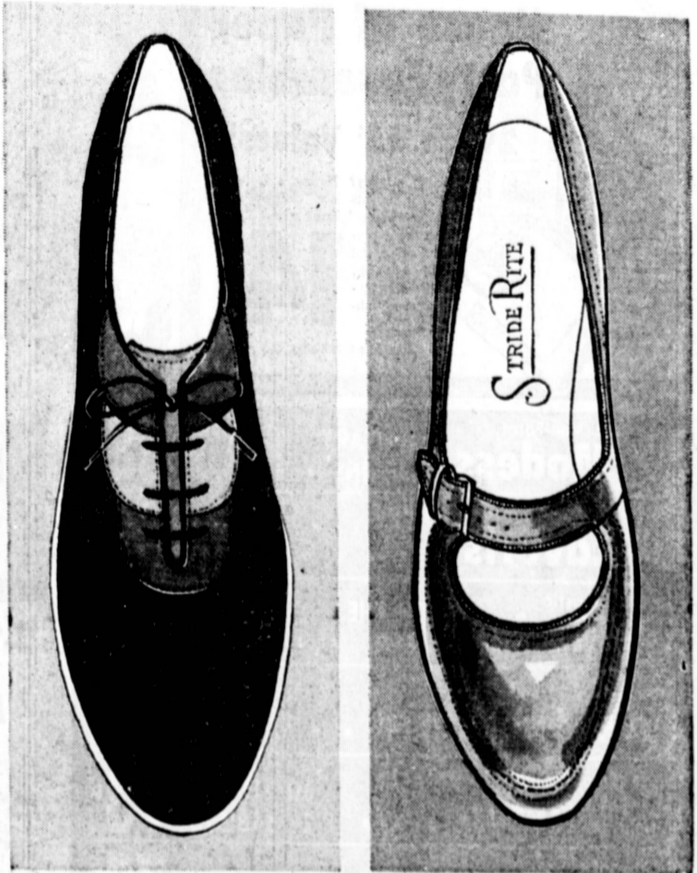

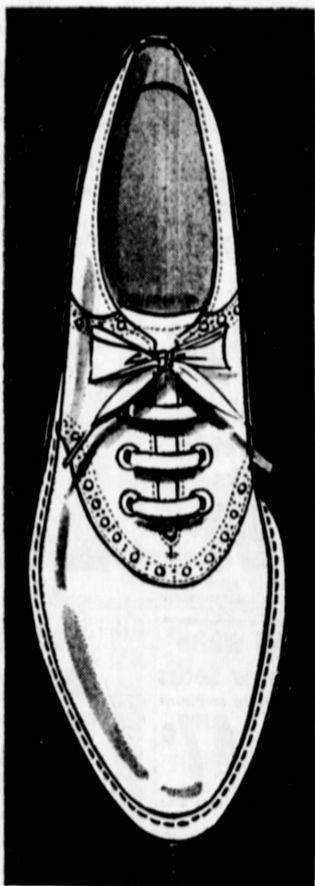
