Pirate Supper Dance To Conclude Event

Portuguese Bend Horse Show For Children's Hospital on Sept. 21-22

Portuguese Bend National Horse Show will be presented for the sixth year by the Palos Verdes Peninsula Committee as a benefit for Children's Hospital on Sept. 21 and 22. The two-day event will be held at the Portuguese Bend Riding Club, Narcissa Drive. Mrs. Thomas Marion Murphy is serving as chairman with Mmes. Robert L. Pruyn and Stephen F. Hinchliffe as co-chairmen. Mrs. Jack Davidson is president of the committee.

Top exhibitors and the champion horses of California will be competing in this show, which last year attracted 17,000 spectators. New classes have been added to the competition, increasing the number of entries over the 640 of the past year.

Manager and announcer will be Allen Ross, manager of the Grand National Horse Show at Cow Palace, the Santa Barbara National Horse Show and others of the largest shows on the west coast. Judges will be Robert Rice of Rancho Santa Fe, Louis Garino of Roseville, AHS steward, ringmaster,

paddock steward, and secretary will be Horace Rupp, Santa Barbara, Col. Alex Syn of Stanford, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Glasscock of Palos Verdes.

In the All-Junior Show on Saturday there will be three medal classes among the 18 classes competing. Winners will be eligible to enter the final competitions for the United States championships to be held in the fall at Cow Palace and Madison Square Garden. Permanent silver trophies will be awarded all winners. Frank A. Vanderlip High-Point Perpetual Trophy will be placed in competition for the first year to be awarded to a junior exhibitor.

The Open Show on Sunday will have ten stake classes competing along with classes of hunters and jumpers. Perpetual trophies, along with permanent silver trophies, will go to winners of all stake classes.

Added attractions will be Mark Smith and Mr. Stuff presented both days in exhibitions of horsemanship and

horse talent acclaimed by circus, horse show, television and motion picture audiences.

The Metlox Poppy Trail carriage collection of some fifty antique driving rigs will be on display next to the show ring. Between events, drivers and passengers, in the costume of the carriage's period, will circle the ring. Evan K. Shaw, president of the Metlox Mfg. Co. and a resident of Rolling Hills, is owner of this collection.

The two-day event will be concluded with a Sunday supper dance honoring all exhibitors of the 1963 Portuguese Bend Show. "Pirates from Portuguese Bend" is the theme of the event to be held in the courtyard of the riding club. Mrs. Lowell Dryden and Mrs. Ray W. Seawright are serving as party co-chairmen. Joe Moshay and his orchestra will play for dancing under the stars.

Children's Hospital, which benefits from the annual horse show, serves many purposes other than its highly specialized facilities and ex-

perience for the care of critically ill children. It is one of the nation's foremost pediatric research centers with 100 scientists and assistants working full time in 10 major research divisions.

The building fund campaign is underway to build a new main hospital building that will replace the present 50-year-old facility and provide adequate and modern facilities for the hospital's research programs.
