The excitement that came with the finding of a 27 page parchment, the original land grant given by the King of Spain to Sisto Berryessa in 1843, in the walls of the Ber-ryessa ranchero in northern California recently, spread all the way to Torrance where members of the fourth and fifth generations of this famw live.

On Nov. 3, 1843, Gov. Man-uel Micheltorena signed the document which turned over the 35,515 acres to the broth-ers, Sisto and Jose Berryessa. Actually the brothers came into possession of the valley into possession of the valley in February 1842, when the Mexican commandant at the nearby Sonoma community gave the family the right to use the valley for cattle ranching and agriculture. Sisto Berryessa was born March 29, 1819, and died Cast

March 28, 1818 and died Sept. 23, 1874. Like his brother, he was buried in an unknown gravesite on the family ranch in Berryessa Valley, now covered by the lake.
