points have been made, any specific effort to entice new industry must deal with the basic economics of establishing a plant and doing business profitably in Torrance.

"On such subjects as com-parative tax rates, protective zoning and building codes, wel-fare costs and labor rates, our area is at a growing disadvan-

PROFESSIONAL industrial development specialists feel that these specific economic stumbling blocks are actually results, or manifestations, of the true difficulty which, simply stated, is a lack of understanding and desire for industry by the local citizens.

Owens indicated that while

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Owens indicated that while most local people "give lip service" to an active desire for service to an active desire for new industry and new job op-portunities, close investigation often reveals that too many people "couldn't care less." Many citizens want just "clean industries of the research and development variety and condone zoning and tax structures so as to virtually preclude anything else.

Compounding this problem is the unfortunate and com-pletely antiquated concept of a manufacturing industry as a noisy, dirty, unsightly menace to the aesthetic aspect of the community," the Chamber manager continued.

"THERE SEEMS to be little realization that almost without exception, modern manufactur-ing industries have been suc-cessful in controlling or eliminating the objectionable as-

pects of their operations.

"Rapidly rising land costs, increasing tax rates, decreasing land areas for manufacturing, at times an almost-hostile atti-tude towards manufacturingand zoning, coupled with a general public apathy and lack of true understanding of the essential role of industry in a local economy," Owens asserts, "manifests themselves in an increasingly dangerous industrial climate."

A principal objective and major effort on the part of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce will be a concerted and continuing campaign to inform the local citizency on the vital color industry plays in the role industry plays in the economy of the community, and the need for "an atmos-phere" in which local industries can expand and new, tax-paying, payroll-producing man-ufacturers will want to locate.
