Guild Meets

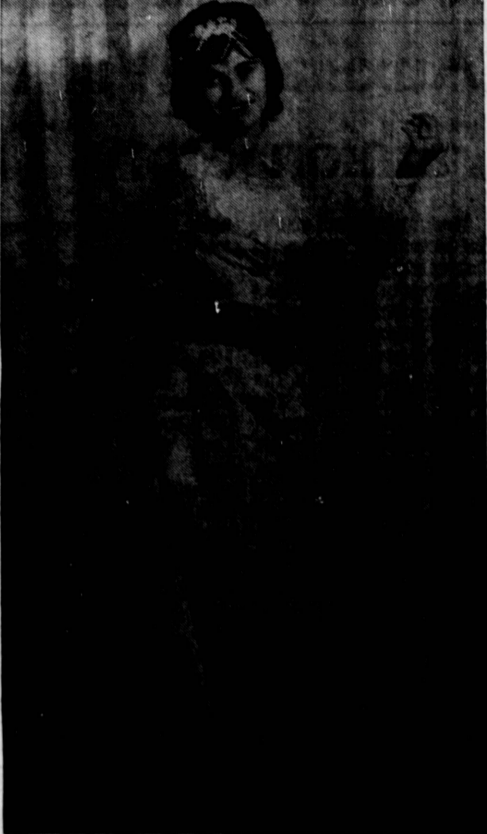
