'A Good Rule -Tip 15% of Bill

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> Dear Ann Landers: I have read a few letters in your column about tipping. All the yelling seems to be whether to tip or not to tip. As you pointed out, tipping is an es-tablished part of life in these limited States whether we united States, whether we like it or not. What I would like to see in print is a few tips on WHEN to tip and HOW MUCH to tip, Will you help me as well as thousands of others who are also un-ure? Thanks - C BASES sure? Thanks - GRASSY GREEN

> Dear Grassy: A good rule of thumb when dining out is this: Tip 15 per cent of the bill for good service. For es-pecially good service or extra attention, make is closer to 20 per cent.

> If you are grabbing a quick bite at a lunch counter and if the gal did not treat you as if she was slopping the hogs, leave 15 cents under the plate. If you had only a cup leave 15 cents under the plate. If you had only a cup of coffee and she served you more coffee in the cup than in the saucer, leave 5 cents.

Taxi drivers are a hard-working bunch and since many of them are philosoph-ers and political scientists as well as drivers, the conversa-tion is worth something. A 15 cent tip on a 50 cents meter, 20 cents on a 70 cent meter and two-bits on a dollar ride is about right. is about right. If you stay in a hotel al-

ways leave a tip for the maid. About 50 cents a night is right. The bell-boy who takes the luggage to your room should get at least 50 cents for the trip with one bag, and a dollar for two bags or more.

A bootblack should get a dime, and when you buy a newspaper on the street it's nice to let the man keep the extra pennies or the nickel.

The beauty operator should be tipped 15 per cent of the bill unless the operator owns the shop. Most shop owners

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If you are a weekend guest in the home of a friend or relative and there is a maid on the place you should leave the maid a couple of dollars in an envelope with her name on it. (Don't give it to the hostess and ask her to give it το Daisy.) If you have stayed two weeks, Daisy should get about \$5.

Don't offer to tip a nurse, a mailman, a bus driver, a milkman, a receptionist in an office or airline personnel. (Sky-caps should be tipped about 50 cents for a short haul, but not stewardesses or ticket agent. The latter do not accept tips.) The janitor or elevator op-
