

CalBank Earnings Increased

Net operating earnings of gain of \$278,061,962 or 13 per cent. United California Bank for the first nine months of 1963 were 34 per cent ahead of last year, totaling \$11,762,268 for 1963 as compared with \$8,768,622 in 1962.

Loans were \$1,661,193,343 compared with \$1,403,630,561 on Sept. 30 last year, a gain of \$257,562,782 or 18 per cent.

Capital funds reflect the recent sale of \$35 million in capital notes and now total \$203,747,074, compared with \$167,689,576. Rights to purchase 431,014 shares of common stock at \$62.50 were issued to shareholders of record Sept. 13 and will expire on Oct. 22. Capital funds to be received through this stock offering

total \$26,938,375, after which total capital funds will be approximately \$230 million.

City to Receive Road Assistance

Allocation of \$74,325 to assist Torrance in improvement and maintenance of 26 major streets within the city has been approved by the Board of Supervisors. Los Angeles County reappropriates its gas tax funds to aid cities in road maintenance projects.
