Brigitta arrived in the United States on Aug. 15, from Austria. She is staying in this country on a scholarship provided by the AFS.

"Brigitta," as she is called, likes the United States very much. "It is so very, very different," she says. "I do not mean that Austria is a slow country. It is not. But life in the United States is so much more hasty. People go here and there so quickly, always thinking of how soon they will get to the next place. It is more hectic, but it is fun."

WHEN IN Austria, Brigitta attended an all-girls school. "I like much better to be mixed," she laughed. "It is so much more fun, and friendlier, too. School life in this country is much more free than in Austria. There one concentrates on studies more. Here, studies are important, but so is a social life."

Youth for Christ Request For School Use Withdrawn

A request for use of South High School facilities by the Youth for Christ chapter in south Torrance has been withdrawn by the group after the Board of Education ordered a ruling of the county counsel on its legality.

Trustees received the request during their meeting Monday evening and ordered the ruling after Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of schools, cited a section in the California State Constitution prohibiting the use of public school facilities by religious groups on a "direct or indirect" basis.

Robinson told the board that the group meets on campus at several other schools through lease arrangements. After some discussion, the trustees asked for the ruling, saying such arrangements would open the door to many other requests.

The Youth for Christ organization, which meets once each week prior to classes, presently uses a church in the area. They had sought the school facilities on a lease basis in order to shorten the distance which members must walk.

The "World's Largest Rummage Sale," sponsored by the Pasadena Auxiliary of Boys Republic, will be held Oct. 24 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the Pasadena Civic Auditorium, Green Street and Garfield Avenue in Pasadena.

Organized in 1911, the auxiliary held its first rummage sale in 1914 with a membership of 12. Today there are 125 active, 39 associate and 140 sustaining members. In 50 years the sale has grown to 23 departments.

All proceeds from the annual sales benefit Boys Republic, established in 1907. A non-profit, nonsectarian 215-acre farm community, Boys Republic, located south of Pomona, is home to approximately 130 teen-age boys from broken homes, orphans and wards of the court, who need help with their problems.

Rummage sale proceeds over the years have provided many needed services and equipment for the farm, including gymnasium and equipment, remodeling of cottage-dormitories, refurbishing of infirmary and addition to dental clinic, purchase of school bus, building of Olympic swimming pool, donation of station wagon, and funds for psychiatric treatment.
