

Average Production Job Now Pays \$114.90 Weekly

Average weekly earnings of manufacturing production workers in the Los Angeles Long Beach metropolitan area have continued to rise and, as of June, 1963, totaled \$114.90 per week.

According to the report by Security First National Bank's research department, this was approximately 10 per cent ahaed of the mid-1960 level and nearly 2 per cent above a year ago.

The average weekly earnings for June were 46 cents short of the all-time high of \$115.36 recorded in the local area last December, Security Bank said.
